In Memoriam - Jean Bradley

Editor's Note: Jean Bradley (Chisholm) was a student at the School 1926-1937 and was one of our many high achievers. A truly remarkable woman who devoted her life to community service. Sadly Jean passed away last year but memory of her service will live on.

The following article from the "Gladstone Observer" on 19/06/2007 gives detail of this service:

Mrs Jean Boreham BRADLEY Qld, awarded the Order of the Medal of Australia (OAM). For service to the community, particularly through the Queensland branch of the Country Women's Association of Australia.

Jean Bradley doesn't know who nominated her to receive the Order of the Medal of Australia (OAM), but it's a good bet it was the Queensland Country Women's Association of which she has been a member since the 1940s.

She was awarded the medal last week for service to the community, particularly through the Queensland Branch of the CWA.

It's not the first award to come Jean's way. Other awards and recognitions include: the Stratford International Trophy, 1980; a Commonwealth Recognition for Senior Australians; the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal, 1977; two Service Bars, QCWA; and the United Nations Association of Australia Award (Queensland Division).

Jean said she owed her life to a member of the QCWA when she was with the Springsure branch.

'l didn't show up for one meeting, and one member kept insisting there must be something wrong,' she said.

'When they came out, they found me under a tractor that I had been driving which had overturned in a washout. I had been there for 12 hours.'



Jean held a number of positions in the various branches and divisions in the QCWA including stints as vice president in both the Central Highlands and Port Curtis.

Jean was instrumental in organising a trip to the Fijian village of *Soso* and drawing attention to the community's lack of pharmaceutical goods following storms that destroyed the pharmacy.

- Member, Dingo branch, 1940s-1969; served terms as president and treasurer
- Member, Springvale branch, 1969 -1974; served terms as secretary and treasurer
- QCWA representative, Queensland Division, United Nations Association of Australia, 1974-1976

- QCWA representative, consumer affairs Co-ordinated welfare relief visit to Fiji, Associated Country Women of the World, 1984 - attended eight international conferences
- Supporter, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands Country Women's Associations
- Volunteer, Curtis Island Rural Fire Brigade, since 1985. Inaugural member (and life member) Southend Progress Association, since 1950
- Member, Australian Red Cross, Dingo and Springsure - served as vice-president
- Coordinator for the Girl Guides, 1980s
- Justice of the Peace for more than 25 years

Historical Happenings - The Headmistress' Ghost

Editor's Note: I hope readers have been enjoying *Historical Happenings* which I have commenced as a regular article in *Chit Chat.* This segment relates the story of the ghost of Miss Helen Downs, our first Headmistress, and was drawn from the following website:

Rockhampton Girls Grammar School has a long and distinguished history. Founded in 1892 to provide a superior education for the daughters of wealthy pastoralists and the city's leading citizens, the school prospered.

This was due largely to the first headmistress, an English spinster named Helen E Downs. Miss Downs was a character, a free thinker with progressive ideas on female education, women's emancipation and most other subjects.

At a speech day in 1898 she reminded parents that 'the senior classes in her school were for training cultured women who would exert an uplifting influence in social matters- and not waste their time on prettiness.'

'Prettiness' was one of Miss Downs' chief dislikes. She was not pretty herself and may have been slightly lame. She refused to allow staff or students to restrict their bodies with corsets or 'paint' their faces.

Sensible clothes, sensible diet, fresh air, exercise and lots of soap and water were her recipe for building sturdy bodies and sound minds.

Helen Downs' unconventional ideas probably shocked and upset many people, but the scholastic achievements of her students reached such heights that she was tolerated by her critics and encouraged by the liberal minded. The impression one gets reading about her 100 years later is of boundless energy, a brilliant mind and total dedication to her vocation.

It is not surprising that such a strong and controversial character should still exert a powerful influence over the school she headed more than a century ago, but the form that influence takes is quite unexpected.

According to school legend Miss Downs' ghost lives in the school bell tower and comes down from her eyrie once a year, at 11 pm on 11 November.

The ghost makes its way through the girls' dormitories, selects the girl with the longest blonde hair, produces a pair of spectral scissors and hacks off the victim's tresses.

If you don't believe this story ask the girls of Year Nine. They will tell you that they believe in the ghost of Miss



Downs, and watch the mixture of excitement, embarrassment, pride and fear on their faces as they recount their experiences.

"We had our mattresses in the middle of E dorm, on the night of 11 November 1995. Another girl who lives in H dorm, and had the longest, blondest hair came in to our room- she was really scared that the ghost was going to chop off her beloved hair.

At 11.00 pm, we heard a noise in the roof. We all screamed. A mistress came in and quietened us. She said there was no such thing as ghosts and that it was probably a bandicoot in the roof. A bandicoot in the roof? I'm sure it was Miss Downs.

Miss Downs comes drifting down from her hideout and scares the living daylights out of new and old boarders. If the girl she selects puts up a fight the ghost will drag her up and down the stairs till her hair falls out- but wait, there's more.

We have three student ghosts as well. One is a girl who died of scarlet fever and another is Miss Downs' first victim. She wanders up and down the stairs trying to warn us. I was told Miss Downs was a nice ghost who goes around at night checking that we are looking after her school, tucks us in and gives us a kiss on the cheek. I think she is far too nice to hurt anyone."

RGGS Speech Night 2017 - Guest Speaker

Sarah Guilfoyle boarded at Girls' Grammar from grade nine to 12, graduating in 1993. She was a prefect, Weaver House Captain, a rower and as one of the tallest in her class – quite often Pollywonga.

After school, Sarah continued with the rowing she fell in love with at Girls' Grammar, winning an Australian Title, making the Australian Junior Team and training at the Queensland Academy of Sport, before accepting a full athletic scholarship to attend Jacksonville University in Florida in the United States.

Captain of the Women's Varsity Crew Team for 3 years, Sarah received Most Valuable Player twice and in her Sophomore year, was awarded the Douglas B. Milne Award for excellence in Athletics, Academics, Leadership and Sportsmanship.

Sarah completed a double communications major in Public Relations and Journalism and a minor in Psychology, while also fulfilling a number of leadership, committee and



representative positions such as news editor of the college paper, President of the International Student Association and President of the Student Athletic Advisory Council.

While at college, Sarah also founded a not for profit assuming the role of Director, Media Relations. This included managing relationships, information and media for high profile personnel, athletes and celebrities including Grammy Award winner Alicia Keys and New England Patriots Cornerback, Ty Law. Upon returning to Australia, Sarah established SG Promotions in 2005, a communications consultancy serving a client base from London to Jakarta, from Tasmania to the Gulf and across the Bowen Basin.

Her client portfolio included small to medium business, agriculture and not for profits and primarily serviced mining and resources including BHP Billiton, BMA and Peabody Energy.

In 2017, after working for herself for her entire working career, Sarah accepted a full-time role with an existing client and one of the largest family-run beef enterprises in Australia, Hewitt Cattle Australia, as Manager - Communications, Projects, Health and Safety.

Sarah is also a director on the board of Basketball Queensland.

The co-owner of global website Femeconomy has been nominated in the 2017 Telstra Queensland Business Women Awards celebrating her empowering and female-orientated business.

Jade was overwhelmed with the nomination in the For Purpose and Social Enterprise category saying when she was informed she couldn't stop her excited screams from running down the phone line.

With her sister-in-law, Alanna Bastin-Byrne by her side the powerhouses created their business from the ground up in a hope to diversify the concept of online shopping.

Femeconomy boasts exclusive female driven brands from businesses run by at least 30% of women on the board of directors or 50% female owned.

The former CQ University graduate said this tribute was a reflection of the growth of the business in the last 12 months.

"Being able to communicate this entirely new concept



we launched into a new brand onto the internet is so humbling, especially in such a competitive online environment," she said.

"People are really engaging with the content we are sharing and we are so proud of what we've created."

Since its 2016 launch, Femeconomy recorded a huge spike in overall online engagement jumping from a mere 2,000 people to 350,000 a month.
