From the Editor

I recently received a letter from Marjorie Fleming (Hoskings) who was a student at RGGS 1951-1952. I thought readers might be interested in hearing news of Marjorie's sister, Betty Stabler (Hoskings) who was also a student at the School 1938-1939.

Betty is now living with her daughter in Gracemere and is fast approaching 95. She is enjoying being with family and watching the progress of her two great grand-daughters who both attend RGGS. Betty is able to attend lots of school events.

Both Betty and Marjorie attended the RGGS but 12 years apart. Marjorie started off at the Kindergarten before it was closed during World War 11 as it was too close to the Reservoir.

The kindergarten at that time was located further up the hill from the main school building which is now known as Paterson House. I can only assume that one of the rea-



sons for the closure was that the Reservoir, being a major part of the town's infrastructure, might be considered a bombing target by the enemy.

The Kindergarten was erected in 1899 and was originally an isolation room for sick students. Both girls and boys were students at the Kindergarten.

Historical Happenings—The Grammar School Era

Editor's Note: The following article was sourced from the Department of Education and details the history of how Grammar Schools evolved in Queensland. Originally there were 10 Grammar Schools but Maryborough Boys Grammar School and Maryborough Girls Grammar School were transferred into the State school systems for economic reasons.



In 1860, Queensland's first Parliament passed the *Grammar Schools Act* which allowed for the establishment of a grammar school in any town where at least £1000 could be raised locally. The Act provided for a Government subsidy of twice this local contribution. When established, each school could be run by its own seven-member board, including a Government representative.

The first grammar school established under the 1860 Act was the Ipswich *Grammar* School, opened in 1863. In the years 1863-1892, 10 grammar schools were opened, the last being the Rockhampton Girls Grammar School.

Queensland grammar schools followed the traditional English model, with curricular dominated by classical subjects like Latin and Greek. Because fees were charged, the children of gentlemen, the wealthy of the colony, were the only ones likely to avail themselves of grammar schools. These schools catered for an elite, in accord with the nineteenth century view that popular education beyond the elementary level was not desirable.

Provision for the award of scholarships to grammar schools was made in the 1860 *Grammar Schools Act*. The first awards were made in 1864 for the 1865 school year at Ipswich Grammar School (the only one then existing). Between 1865 and 1873 only about twelve such scholarships were awarded. Selection was on the basis of a personal examination by a senior officer (in 1864 the Colonial Secretary acted as the first examiner). The first formal Scholarship examination was held in July 1883.

Until 1914, a fixed number of scholarships was awarded though the number varied over the years depending on the amount of money allocated. From 1914, this system was changed and all students obtaining 50 per cent or more in the examination were awarded a scholarship to any approved secondary school (which by then included State high schools).

In 1891, a Royal Commission on Education advised that a 'system of secondary schools more directly controlled as to foundation and management by the State would be less expensive and quite as effective in the education of the youth of

the colony'. Grammar schools would continue but would be supplemented by a State secondary system similar to the 'superior' school system in NSW in which secondary classes were attached to primary schools.

Initially, the Department of Public Instruction opposed this extension of secondary education. The

Under Secretary and General Inspector were both conservative men who believed that the Department had enough to do to implement compulsory, free and secular primary education.

Furthermore, they felt that Queensland's economy was not ready for such an expansion of secondary education: 'The State can only absorb a certain quantity of highly educated labour and if it spends the years of its young people in the pursuit of higher education, there will be a loss as these young people find themselves forced to fall into the ordinary avocations of life'.

Perhaps there were social reasons too for this fear of 'over education'. Despite these doubts, the *Education Act* of 1875 was amended in 1897 to allow additional subjects to be taught. Literature, science, algebra and geometry were added to the syllabus of sixth class, the highest in the primary school.

Though this change affected a small minority of schools, it can be argued that State secondary education had thus come to Queensland. Another area of development of secondary education was within the technical colleges.

During the 1880s and the 1890s, some of them provided night classes in grammar school subjects. By 1898, the Brisbane Technical College was providing a full secondary curriculum during the day and in 1905 the South Brisbane Technical College opened a high school which prepared day students for the Sydney public examinations.

In 1910, the Department of Public Instruction established separate day schools within the two Technical Colleges directly under their administration - Central Technical College, Brisbane and Warwick Technical College.

Though strongly oriented towards technical education, and consequently not regarded as the first State high schools, these schools did prepare students for the Junior and Senior examinations of the University of Queensland.

Amazing Grammar Girls - Matron Doris Broomfield

Editor's Note: Members will recall reading about our amazing Grammar girl, Doris Broomfield (1919-1921) in an interview conducted by Dot Skewes in 1994 which I previously serialised in Chit Chat.

Since then, I have been conversing with Ashley Reid of the Australian Country Hospital Heritage Association, who has provided me with further details of this amazing lady's life and her dedication to public health and the nursing service..

Many of our Old Girls have pursued a nursing career and so I thought this might be of further interest to them.

Doris Broomfield was born in Rockhampton on 8th November 1905, the second of four daughters to Mary and Horatio. She died in Greenslopes Hospital Brisbane on 23rd July 1999 aged 93 years. Her ashes were later interred with her parents at the North Rockhampton Cemetery.

Doris attended school at Allenstown Primary School and the Rockhampton Girls Grammar School. She also successfully passed a dressmaking course at the Gracemere Rural College and went on to obtain high marks in the Trinity College of Music Examination in June 1921.

The Queensland Department of Public Instruction, recognising that many subjects taught to primary school students in rural areas did not equip them for country life after school, introduced an innovative experiment to teach students appropriate skills in agriculture and domestic science, including dressmaking.

In 1917, the first of 28 Rural Schools was established in Queensland with Gracemere Rural School opening in 1920. The District Inspector of Schools however closed the Gracemere School in 1924 believing the community needed technical



rather than agricultural skills and advised students to continue their studies at the Rockhampton Technical College.

After leaving school, Doris commenced four years General Nurse Training at the Mount Morgan Hospital in 1925 and successfully graduated in 1929. Her musical background came to the fore when in November 1926 she played music at a fund raising event and fancy dress dance held in the Mount Morgan Nurse's Quarters to raise funds for the Mount Morgan Hospital fund. The grand sum of £90 was raised from this well attended function.



During the 1920s, Mount Morgan was a bustling mining town with one of the richest gold mines in Australia. The mine commenced operation in 1882 and during its 99 years of mining a total of 225 tons of gold, 50 tons of silver and 360,000 tons of copper was taken from the ground.

The population increased from 3,514 in 1891 to 9,772 in 1911 and mining accidents occurred frequently. Hence a hospital was an essential part of the town's infra-structure.

The Mount Morgan Hospital was opened by Mrs J Wesley Hall, Mayoress of Mt Morgan, on 20 August 1890. In 1901, gas replaced kerosene lamps and wood burning stoves. Electricity replaced gas in 1935. The building was partially demolished in 1968 to make way for a new hospital.

Following completion of her general training, Miss Broomfield gained a post graduate certificate in Maternal and Child Welfare in Brisbane in 1929 and a Midwifery Certificate at Bundaberg's Lady Chelmsford Hospital in 1931 before moving to Western Australia.

Australia entered World War II shortly after the invasion of Poland, declaring war on Germany on 3 September 1939 and in February 1941, Miss Broomfield enlisted in the Australian Army Nursing Service (AANS) as a Lieutenant, being promoted to the rank of Captain in April 1941.

The Australian Army Nursing Service was established on 1 July 1902 as a reserve staffed by volunteer civilian nurses. The Service became part of the Australian Regular Army in 1949 as the Royal Australian Army Nursing Corps (RAANC). Members were active at the outbreak of World War II serving in Australia and overseas.

Following her enlistment, she was posted overseas, travelling on the troopship Queen Elizabeth to serve at the 2/7 Australian General Hospital (AGH) at Rehovot, Israel and at Sister's Clearing Station in Gaza. Returning to Australia she was posted to Army Hospitals, 2/1 AGH, Western Australia, 116 AGH Charters Towers Queensland and 112 AGH Greenslopes Brisbane until her discharge from AANS on 6 February 1946.

Just weeks after her discharge from five years Army service, Miss Broomfield was appointed Deputy Matron of

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the Bundaberg Hospital and later accepted an appointment as Matron of the Maryborough Hospital. She undertook further study to complete a Diploma of Nursing Administration and gained Fellowship of the College of Nursing in 1963.

During the 1950s, Brisbane was a growing city with an urgent need for a large general hospital on the south side of the city to cope with an increasing population. A newly built hospital known as the South Brisbane Auxiliary Hospital was opened in the grounds of The Diamantina Hospital in 1956. The new hospital remained under the control of the Brisbane General Hospital until "Independence Day" on 1st July 1959 when it became a separate Hospital. It was renamed Princess Alexandra Hospital (PA) in 1959 following a visit from Princess Alexandra.

Providing trained staff on secondment and student nurses on "Ward Move" rotations to the new hospital was the responsibility of Matron Burbridge from the Brisbane General Hospital until after the appointment on 27th October 1958 of Miss Broomfield as the first Matron of the South Brisbane Auxiliary Hospital.

At the time of her appointment, there were 757 inpatients in the Acute Section and 399 patients in the Chronic Section of the Diamantina Hospital and 3,893 outpatients visited clinics during the week ended September 14th 1958. The number of student nurses were first year 142, second year 123, third year 56 and fourth year 38.

Following "Independence Day" student nurses were informed by Miss Broomfield if they wished to nominate to complete their training at the South Brisbane Auxiliary Hospital and receive a General Nurse Certifi-

cate from the hospital, they could apply in writing to do so.

The first Graduation Ceremony for 51 graduating nurses was conducted at the hospital in December 1960. The graduate nurse badge was designed by Miss Broomfield and Miss Marjorie Dickfos who commenced at the hospital in 1957 becoming Sister in Charge of the School of Nursing in January 1960.

Nurse education transferred to the new School of Nursing in August 1966 and in October 1970 just weeks before her retirement on 22nd November the school was renamed in her honour "The Doris Broomfield School of Nursing" and a commemorative plaque was unveiled by the Minister for Health, the Hon. S. D. Tooth.

Nurses appreciated Miss Broomfield allowing them to organize and hold dances several times a year in the Recreation Hall on the ground floor of the quarters.

Nurses excitedly decorated the Rec Hall in a theme for the night and lots of fun was had "dressing up" for the occasion.

Boyfriends were allowed to attend but were carefully scrutinized by the Welfare Officers ensuring they didn't get a chance to put one foot over the invisible line that separated the living area from the Recreation Hall. These occasions relieved the institutional feel of the nurses' home and won enormous respect for "The Matron". Recognising the need for nurses to retain an ongoing commitment to nursing and opportunities to maintain friendships, Miss Broomfield organised the formation of The Past Nurses Association, holding the first meeting in November 1967. This Association continues today.

Various fundraising activities have resulted in providing funds for conferences for nursing staff, equipment for patients and relatives as well as providing opportunity to remain in contact with nursing colleagues from years gone by.

Some years after her retirement in 1970, Miss Broomfield made notes on her time spent at the hospital including her frustration at the process required for submissions to increase staffing levels and the disappointment when these were frequently ignored or only small increases were made after months of delay.

Among her notes, she also recalled great improvements to the staff dining room with more varied menus and better quality china and cutlery being purchased but disappointment at not being able to introduce hot meals for night staff. Despite the many problems encountered from overcrowding in the wards and at times insufficient nursing staff, Miss Broomfield praised the high level of cooperation from all levels of staff.

Years of dedicated service to the nursing profession was acknowledged by the award of an Order of the British Empire – Member Civilian, Post nominal MBE © in June 1971. She is recognised in the Faith Hope and Charity Australian Women and Imperial Honours record 1901-1989 and the IT'S AN HONOUR website – Australians celebrating Australians. Miss Broomfield died in Greenslopes Hospital Brisbane on 23rd July 1999.

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Special Service Award - Beres Walker

Another one of our very special Brisbane Branch ladies has been honoured and recognized for her many years of selfless service to the OGA. Beres Walker (Gillespie) attended RGGS 1949-1950.

Pictured right is Beres being presented with her Special Service Badge by Elsie Speight who nominated Beres for the award. Jean Bulley seconded the nomination - both these ladies are recipients themselves of the Special Service Award which shows the calibre of the ladies of the Brisbane OGA who have all worked so hard over the years to maintain a once flourishing branch but which is now declining due to the lack of younger members to take up the mantra.

The Brisbane OGA meets five times a year for a social morning tea at the Keri Craig Emporium. New members are very welcome to join us for social engagement and also to hear of current happenings at the school. The Branch provides a \$100.00 Nessie Foster Memorial Prize each year to a student for Outstanding School Citizenship.

Beres' citation reads as follows:

- Committee Service: Beres served in the role of Committee Secretary of the Brisbane Branch from 1995 to 2000 during the Presidency of both Jean Bulley and Elsie Speight. Beres was an enthusiastic Secretary who encouraged strong attendance at monthly meetings. This was at a time when membership was at a premium with large attendances of 100 at the Christmas Lunches. Thus the role of Secretary at this time held many responsibilities.
- Branch Newsletter: Beres held regular meetings at her home and printed the Branch Newsletter at no cost to the Branch. Without Beres doing such a sterling job as Secretary and Newsletter Editor, the Branch would not have had the membership strength and enjoyment during her tenure.
- 65th Branch Anniversary Publication: Beres produced a one-off coloured seven page publication incorporating the President's address and report to celebrate the 65th Anniversary of Brisbane Branch in July 1998. The speech reply by our then esteemed Patron Dot Donald was also included. The publication also included 11 colour photographs of members at this time.



- Meeting Venue: After the Branch ceased to hold its regular meetings at the Theodore Club, Beres kindly offered the use of her home for these meetings until a new venue could be found.
- Regular attendee: Beres is a regular attendee at Brisbane Branch meetings contributing many insightful suggestions for the running of the Branch. In the past, Beres helped organise the popular day Bus Trips which were very much enjoyed by members. In 1998, Beres accompanied the then President, Jean Bulley, to Rockhampton for the 1998 RGGS Speech Night.

Beres is an invaluable member of the Brisbane Branch of the OGA and has provided selfless service to the Branch over many years.

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Greenslopes Hospital was built in 1942 by the Department of Veterans Affairs to provide care to returned veterans and was called The Greenslopes Repatriation Hospital. Ramsay Health Care bought the hospital in January 1995 renaming it Greenslopes Private Hospital. An agreement at the time of the sale ensured Australian veterans and their widows would continue to receive the services previously provided at the Greenslopes Repatriation Hospital.

Excerpts - Old Girls' Notes -1964 School Magazine

Editor's Note: I came across a 1964 School Magazine and spotted the Old Girls' Notes. The OGA was very active in those days and enjoyed quite an enthusiastic membership. The notes were quite comprehensive and listed the career paths of many girls. I'm sure our senior Old Girls will recognize many names and maybe even see their own name in print. Because of space, I have selected only a portion of the notes.

Old Girls' Notes

The Annual Meeting of the Rockhampton Branch of the Old Girls' Association was held on the School Terrace on Tuesday 24th March 1964. After welcoming Miss Millicent Jackson, Patroness of the Association and the Old Girls who were present, the President, Miss Robyn Millroy, read her Annual Report.

The Secretary, Miss Barbara Grant, read the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting and the Treasurer, the Financial Statement, after which the election of officer bearers took place. The results were as follows:

Our Annual Afternoon Party took place on the School Terrace on Saturday 3 October. This year, a Dress and Shoe Parade, by courtesy of Cooper's and Suzanne Shoes, was arranged which provided an interesting afternoon's entertainment.

Again this year, one of our present girls, Christine Clay, won the bursary presented by the Queensland Girls' Secondary Schools' Club of which our Association is a member.


