Hall of Fame Update

As an Association, we remember the girls who have gone before us. We've seen the paths they have taken. We treasure them.

Our Old Girls are very important to us and so we must not forget them nor the contributions they have made/are making to their School, their chosen profession and to society in general.

This is the tenet of the Hall of Fame to demonstrate that we honour and cherish their memory.

The location of the Hall of Fame is the hallway in Paterson House between the classrooms.

Progress to date:

- In 2021, the OGA donated \$8,000 to the School to paint the hallway for setting up the OGA Hall of Fame. This has been completed.
- Signage has been designed and has now been installed (see photo below). Photos and brief resumes of selected Old Girls will be affixed to the wall below the sign. These will be displayed on a rotational basis or selected for a particular theme or school celebration.
- An application form is to be designed for nominations to the Hall of Fame. This will ensure background information can be presented in a consistent manner.
- The Hall of Fame By-Laws are also being drafted to ensure a formalised nomination process is in place with overriding governance.

The Hall of Fame Sub-Committee consists of Chairperson, Kim Dixon, and members Corinne Shaw, Ngaire Kane, Robyn Meredith and Betty Spence. The Sub-Committee will also be joined by Marilyn Watts who will meet with the other members via Zoom.

Sandra Barnbaum (Boreham) - 1956-1959: You may have heard by now, as Pat (Tomson) Carver was such a lively and likeable member of RGGS OGA, that she passed away in palliative care on about 10th April.

My cousin, Betty (Trott) Rodger, rang to share the news, very upset. They had been close friends since starting at the Girls Grammar together in 1929 when they were five years old.

Betty said Pat's mind was still 'sharp' until a matter of days before she died. If my memory is correct, I think Pat was one of the few old girls to be granted Life Member status, probably on account of her holding executive office in the Old Girls' committee for a lengthy time!

I will personally miss Pat's cheerful optimism and bright company. She was a talented singer for many years and I am sure she will be sadly missed, not only by the Old Girls, but in many areas of the Rockhampton community.

Editor's Note: Pat was only one of 10 Old Girls who have been awarded Honoury Life Membership of the Old Girl's Association for service to the OGA.

Sandra Barnbaum (Boreham) - 1055-1922: I very much appreciate your sending the above video last night. I had forgotten about the Anniversary, but the video helped me to feel I was part of the celebrations and I became just a little emotional as memories of happy school days flooded in. Changes in society and especially education of girls have been simply amazing since 1892. In fact, things have improved markedly even since my time at RGGS in the 1950s.

Dorothy Skewes (Chapman) 1944-1945: Thank you Marilyn for sending me the video When I was a student in 1944-45, I remember thinking when our song said 40 years on, "We will all be dead by then."

In 2020 at the age of 91, I was playing indoor bowls with a lady of 98 years. I am very grateful my mother sent me to RGGS when the attitude was "Do not educate your daughters because they just get married and have children."

I went to my first Old Girls Christmas party in 1988 and have not missed many Christmas lunches or morning teas held on the third Tuesday of second month starting in March each year.

Going to RGGS changed my life because I realised many people will try to help you but it is up to you if you want to succeed. Thank you for brightening my day.

Our School - by Pat Carver

Editor's Note: Sadly one of our OGA icons, Pat Carver, recently passed away at the wonderful age of 98. When Pat was 91, this amazing lady wrote the following article of school reminiscing which I published in the October 2015 Chit Chat. With the School currently celebrating their 130 Year Anniversary, I thought it fitting to republish Pat's memories.

The story begins when my mother, Alexandra Ray Cargill, commenced at the Rockhampton Girls' Grammar School, aged five years, in1903.

In those days, the family lived down in either Derby or Stanley Street. Her cousins, Ida and Maud Todd, older pupils at the school, escorted her to and from school - a long way for little five-year old legs to carry her. Not long after, the family relocated to Agnes Street, very close to the school

I have a close connection with the school on my father's side, too. His cousins, Jessie Headrick and Jane and Beatrice Lilley, also attended the school. Later on, another cousin of my mother's joined the school - Lorraine Irwin.

At that time, boys also attended the kindergarten before going on to the Boys' Grammar School. My mother used to tell me the boys would run a Bracelet Race at their school and they would each run for a girl from Girls' Grammar. The boy who won the race would give the bracelet to the girl he was representing. Roy Jardine, who later became Headmaster at Boys' Grammar, often won the race and on at least one occasion, presented the bracelet to Jessie Headrick.

My mother loved her school and never stopped talking about it, even when quite old. I know the names of some of her teachers well - the beauteous Miss Watson, the severe Miss Downs, of course, and her



even more fearsome mother! My mother spoke fondly of Fraulein Furer who was Swiss and taught both French and German.

During this time at the school, a Major Sheets arrived in town. He put on a concert called "The Living Whist", where the performers played the parts of cards. The girls used to troop down to the Oddfellows' Hall, situated in Denham Street, for rehearsals. When talking to the late Mrs Ailsa Dunn (nee Robertson and a pupil at the school), I asked her about "The Living Whist" as she had appeared in it also. She said to me: 'You and I would be the only ones now to know anything about it'.

Other girls at the school in my mother's day included Hilda Gair (another good tennis player), Florence Marisce, Francie Dunbar, Ruby Florence (later a much-loved teacher at the school), Marjorie McGill and the Robertson girls

Mother recalled that girls who were considered 'not terribly bright' were put into a room called "Remove". It is now an office near the entrance to Paterson House. She also remembered a girl who used to cry a lot and another who would be sent to the

laundry for a bucket for her to weep into. This would undoubtedly be frowned upon today.

My mother and her sister remained at the school until they left at age sixteen. Mother first worked for her father in his brokerage office and then as a bank clerk at the Queensland National Bank during World War One. Aunty Sadie worked at the Union Bank initially and, as she had always been interested in nursing, she later became a Dental Nurse at Church's' Dental Surgery. Few girls went on into their senior years. Exceptions were Adah Stuart and Doris Skyring who both became doctors, and Amy Roseman who attended Teachers' College.

Now I shall move on to my time at Girls' Grammar.

I started at the kindergarten in 1929 aged five, along with Joan Macfarlane and Betty Trott who became lifelong friends. Others I can recall were the Matheson girls and Audrey Hearn, the Walker sisters, Paquita Day and her sister. I was escorted to school for the first few weeks by Lorraine Geddes, a Grammar girl some (Continued on page 7)

nine years my senior, who lived in the same street.

(Editor's Note: Excerpt from an email from Robyn Meredith (Buchanan) the current OGA Treasurer: "My mum, Lorraine Buchanan, née Geddes, had very fond memories of walking Pat to school when Mum was a 'big' girl and Pat was a 'little' girl.""

One of my earliest memories was seeing two senior girls arriving at school in a sulky which they had driven from Pink Lily.

The kindergarten was located in an old wooden building near where McKeague Hall is today. There was a sand pit under the building and some shade trees. I can still remember the Christmas Tree in December. I was not happy once when my chewing gum was confiscated. That teacher was in my bad books, but I did like Mrs Catt, one of the other kindergarten teachers.

I was very happy there for two years when all was rudely disrupted. My father was getting business from the Range Convent, so he removed me to go there, much to my mother's chagrin and I was not pleased either.

I had three years at the Convent and I disliked every one of them. I was relieved when he took me away and I attended the Central Girls' School until Scholarship Class when I was returned to Girls' Grammar. Whilst I enjoyed my few years at Central Girls', I was overjoyed to be returning to Girls' Grammar in 1938.

The Headmistress was Miss Margaret Smith, whom I liked very much. She was tall, raw-boned and sandy-haired, and she only taught the Classics - Latin and Greek. Miss Smith often presided over her classes, wearing her academic gown which was held together with safety pins.

One of my favourite teachers, the earlier-mentioned Miss Florence, told me that Miss Smith regarded her as a 'lesser mortal' because she only taught Commercial subjects and Geography.

Another of my favourite teachers was Miss Hodgkins who taught my favourite subjects - English and History.

Miss Madeline Hulbert was a memorable leading teacher, her main subject being French. "Hully", as we called her, was very 'mannish' with closely-cropped hair, shirt and tie, tweed skirt, thick stockings and stout brogues. To signal the end of a lesson, she would stand in the corridor and give a shrill blast of a whistle which she wore around her neck. I think this made her feel empowered.

Miss Hulbert was also our ballroom dancing teacher. In the winter months, the boys would come over from the boys' school on Friday nights to be our partners, the lesson ending at 9pm.

The transformation of "Hully" was breathtaking! She would emerge on the stage in Paterson House in flow-

ing chiffon and elegant high heels. At the piano on the stage in Paterson House would sit Miss Dorothy Walters - one of her favourite tunes being "It Happened on the Beach at Bali Bali".

Miss Walters, who was only about nineteen, modelled herself on Miss Hulbert and looked like a younger version of her.

At the end of three months of dancing lessons, the girls wore formal, long gowns on the final evening. I got my first evening dress. It was a demure, girlish gown of pink georgette - so different from the glitz and glamour of today's formal gowns.

My mother was so concerned the neckline was too low and, as there were left-over frills, she sewed some on the neckline. On this last night, we actually stayed later than 9pm and were treated to a resplendent repast.

Our uniform at that time was either a box-pleated navy tunic or a navy skirt with any sort of a white blouse. We used to wear ginger ribbed stockings.

No tie was worn. I loved the old style of blazer, complete with gold piping, which sadly, was changed some years ago. The present ones, in my opinion, do not look as if they represent a school in the same way as ours did. For formal occasions, such as choir performances and Speech Night, we were decked out in white dresses and black stockings. The girls thought that we all looked like magpies.

Speech Nights were held on the Basket Ball court (the area at the foot of the stairs) and on one occasion, I can remember it being held on the Terrace. I can still see a friend of mine, Betty Tardent - a very clever girl - collect so many prizes that she could have filled a wheel barrow. Betty left school at Junior to be apprenticed to E.N. Symons as a pharmacist. She had a year or two at the University of Queensland to conclude her course and became a fully fledged pharmacist at just nineteen.

I would love to have done an Academic Course but my father insisted I do a Commercial Course. The male mantra was: "Girls don't need careers. Get a nice office job, then get married." I left school in 1939 and enjoyed my secretarial jobs but I still would have loved the chance to go on to university.

My daughter, Alexandra Louise Carver, started at Girls' Grammar in 1967 and I begged her to continue to complete her senior years but she was determined to leave. I must admit she has flourished in the business world and is CEO of her own IT company which employs a large staff.

My younger daughter, Robyn Margaret Carver, was lucky enough to win a scholarship to Girls' Grammar in 1970 and she pursued an academic course, finishing her last two years at Ipswich Girls' Grammar School. She has a M.Mus (Qual) and an undergraduate degree in Music

Education and teaches Classroom Music at Ipswich Grammar School.

So ends my rambling anecdotes on an institution which has been an integral part of our lives.

Editor's Note: Pat had a lovely singing voice and would lead us in the singing of the School Song at many OGA functions. We were notified of the sad loss of Pat by her daughter, Robyn Tank, who wrote as follows:

"I am messaging to impart the sad news of the death of one of your oldest 'Old Girls', my mother Patricia Joyce Carver née Tompson. Mum died three days ago on 10th April at Arcare Springwood, Brisbane at the age of 98 years and 2 months.

She began her schooling at RGGS in the school's kindergarten at age five in 1929, and apart from brief stints at Central Girls School and The Range College, completed her schooling at RGGS in 1939.

Mum's mother and aunt, Alexa Ray Cargill and Sadie Cargill respectively, were both students at RGGS in the early 1900s, with a trophy donated in their names for Speech Night recipients several years ago. All three adored their school and regaled us with many tales of their school experiences.

Both my sister, Alexa Bowen née Carver of Brisbane and myself, Robyn Tank née Carver of Ipswich were also students at RGGS during the late 1960s and early 1970s.

As mentioned, mum loved her school dearly and one of her many regrets about having to move to Brisbane was her reduced contact with her school. I have included a few photos of mum taken at the age of 96 when she was still fairly physically capable. We miss her terribly."

Amazing Grammar Girl and Teacher - Ida Kennedy

Editor's Note: For this edition of Chit Chat, I would like to honour the memory of Ida Maud Kennedy OAM, BA, B.Ed, AASA/LSA, MACE, HON F MUS.A. Ida was a student at RGGS 1939-1942 and a teacher at the School 1954-1959. Sadly Ida passed away on 17 December 2014. Following is a list of her accomplishments and awards and a resume of her life.

- 1989 Certificate from U.N.I.C.E.F. (Qld.) for most outstanding support given by a College Principal
- 1995 O.A.M (Medal of the Order of Australia) for service to Queensland Education
- 1996 Honorary Fellowship of Music Australia (Hon. F. Mus. A.) for service to the Australian Music Examinations Board
- The Ida Kennedy Building Clayfield College named in her honour

Community Service:

This was a treasured component in her life. The experience and expertise of Ida Kennedy was appreciated throughout the community:

Ida Maud Kennedy, was the only surviving child of Colin Vincent and Ethel Kennedy, born on 4 April 1925 in Rockhampton.

Ida began her Primary then Secondary teaching career (English, Modern History, French, Speech and Drama) at the Girls` Grammar School, Rockhampton. After 15 years there (1959), she was a resident secondary teacher at Moreton Bay College also establishing a practical, career-based non–tertiary entrance course at its Moreton House, Wynnum North. From August 1964 to December 1990, she was resident Principal at Clayfield College.

Over the years, she represented the Association of Independent Girls` Schools of Australia, most intensively as its President 1981-83, on numerous boards and committees and was a member of an official group of Australian Independent School Heads invited to study educational systems in China (1982) and the U.S.S.R. (1984).

After seventeen years on the Queensland Board of Secondary Studies as a Minister for Education nominee, she was its Chairman in 1989. In 1966,



she became a member of the Queensland Australian Music Examinations Board Committee.

In her early years in Rockhampton, as a pianist and singer, she was in various choirs and musical productions and organised many concert programmes for community and charity groups.

After retirement, she was also active in community organisations including Patroness of the Clayfield College Old Girls` Association; six years on the Craigslea Citizens Club, two years as its Vice President and two years as President; five years on the committee of the Rockhampton Old Girls` Association, Brisbane Branch – four years as Vice President; and member of church and garden clubs.

Ida also had membership of the Albion Rotary and Brisbane Lyceum Clubs, O.W.N. (Older Women's` Network) City Branch, Council on the Ageing and Disabled and chairing its Brisbane North and Pine Rivers committee, very worthwhile endeavours.



Miss Ida Kennedy O.A.M., was the Principal of Clayfield College, Brisbane, from 1964 through to 1990, a period of 26 years.

She was dedicated to her position, and strategically led the Clayfield College Community through major periods of growth which included a visionary strategic plan for the development of excellence in teaching and learning, and which also included a significant building program and expansion plan for the college.

Under her leadership the college grew and thrived. The generous funds for our *Miss Ida Kennedy Teacher Scholarship* has been made available through Miss Kennedy's will and her desire to develop the capability of teachers.

The school's second principal, Ida Kennedy, who retired in 1990, saw the establishment of a science building, a new boarding house, an assembly hall, separate primary department, a second boarding house, the music centre and new

classrooms during the 1970s and 1980s. The college Chapel was built in 1985.

Editor's Note: As a final tribute to Ida, I have reprinted excerpts from a quote by Jan Kashin (Brunsdon) that was published in the May 2010 Chit Chat. Jan had just joined the OGA as a Life Member and was asked why she had done so when she couldn't attend any functions.

"Your school days are the most influential time of your life. The template for your future learning and later lifetime responses is laid down by your educators and influenced by your fellow students. Grammar girls as a bunch are guilty of unbridled optimism!

Mrs Black had said the money would be put to good use for the school. I thought that was a good idea.

But for myself, it was a way of acknowledging my educational debt (if there is such a thing?) to Ida Kennedy.

I still use all the tricks of learning that were part of her armoury in 1956. When I became a teacher myself, I modelled my teaching on her role of 'the enabler'.

She taught me how to re-adjust after adversity. She dared me to dream of achieving my fondest goals, knowing that she would always support me with her thoughts and prayers.

She encouraged me to step outside the square and be myself.

The cost of life membership hardly comes close."
