# Kindergarten building update

**From the Editor:** After the May edition of Chit Chat was published, I received a phone call from Barbara Chapman (Squire) who provided some further information on the old Kindergarten building.

Barbara was a boarder at RGGS 1944-1949 and told me that when she was a student at the School, the front building of the Kindergarten housed students from Prep to Grade 5 and the back building housed students Grade 6 and Grade 7.

Miss Smith was the Headmistress during her time at the School and Miss Hubert was her "right-hand man". Barbara recalls both women as being very strict.

I received another phone call from Marion Shedden (Day) who was a student at RGGS 1937-1947. She also attended classes in the Kindergarten building. Marion remembers one room being called the Circle Room which had wide circles painted on the floor. The children would skip and hop around the circles.

The Wider View (the School's Centenary publication by Betty Cosgrove) provides further interesting information on the history of the Kindergarten building: In 1908 the Kindergarten was no longer housed in the little schoolroom at the rear of the main building (Paterson House) but was held in the 'detached residence' which had been built as a contagious diseases ward.

In 1914, a new building, adjacent and similar to the existing structure, was completed and linked by a verandah to the 'detached cottage'.



## Amazing Grammar Girls - Edith Neish - artist extraordinaire

Editor's Note: Edith Neish (Broadfoot) was an RGGS student 1928-1931. During her time she sketched 83 fine old buildings in Winton, Longreach, Emerald, Rockhampton, and Yeppoon.

Edith died in March 2001 at the age of 87. She had just completed the final sketches for another book on Central Queensland's history. What follows is an extract from her autobiography.



I was born in Brisbane, at the Victoria Hospital "St Helen's" on South Quay on the 6th January, 1914.

When I was fourteen, my father was transferred to Rockhampton. The family moved here and I became a pupil at the Girls' Grammar School for three and a half years and majored in Music and Art.

Miss Copas, the Art teacher, suggested to my parents when I left that I continue with art lessons at the Technical College, under the guidance of Miss Reid, who was well known as a talented and excellent teacher. Rev. Fr. Edward Streeton was at that time Master of Music at St Paul's Cathedral. I continued senior music lessons with him.

Many exams were passed until the age of twenty-one when I obtained a Licentiate with the London Royal School of Music. I taught music for several years, which wasn't really in the end to my satisfaction.

Chipps and Nichols at that time were well known Architects in Rockhamp-



ton. Roy Chipps also had an advertising business namely "Art Ads Advertising". He advertised for an Artist Assistant. I answered the advertisement and started working as a Commercial Artist.

When Chipps and Nichols left Rockhampton, I bought the business and started my own studio in Quay Street, still using the same name. This entailed a great variety of work. James Stewart & Co. and J.S. Lucas, the two variety stores, put out catalogues twice a year for summer and winter. I illustrated all their clothes, hats and bags.

I also illustrated for Kirby & Co., the City Printing Works doing numerous pen and ink designs, illuminated addresses, labels on jar tins and bottles and book covers, to name a few. I also worked for the Morning Bulletin, made slides for the picture theatres and show cards for the shops.

In 1941, I married John Lovat Neish who originally lived at Clarence Road, Indooroopilly, Brisbane. He came to reside in Rockhampton in 1934 to take over the management of Burns & Twigg Pty. Ltd. from his great uncle William Burns who had failing health. On his death, Jack became General Managing Director of the Foundry and Engineering Works.


In 1962, with more time on my hands and the family established, I decided to return to my Art Teacher, Miss Reid at the Rockhampton Technical College. I did a course in Oil Painting and China Painting.

Later I exhibited in many galleries, with paintings hanging in private homes, the Council Chambers, Pilbeam Theatre, Mater Hospital, St John's and the Rockhampton Hospital. By request, I have paintings hanging in the Ibusuki Gallery (Sister city of Rockhampton) and Iwasaki's private residence in Japan.



Having had the experience as a Commercial Artist, I decided to do pen, ink and wash drawings of the beautiful historic buildings in Rockhampton. I drew the two Cathedrals, St Joseph's and St Paul's, the two Grammar Schools, the private hospitals, numerous hotels and beautiful old homes. These drawings have been made into prints and place mats, and are sold at the Attic Gallery.

In 1980, I illustrated a book in pen and ink sketches of Old Rockhampton, with co-author Dr Lorna McDonald, the first two editions from the University Press Brisbane and the third editions by the Rockhampton University Press.

## A modern day pioneer - Girlie Goody

Editor's Note: Girlie (Elma) Goody attended Girls Grammar 1954-1956 and is one of our Amazing Grammar Girls. Girlie featured on ABC Landline on the 4 August episode. What follows below are extracts from that programme.

Forty years ago, the banks refused to give Girlie Goody a loan to buy the family farm when her father died because she was a single woman.

Today, this accidental role model is not only a successful cattle producer but one of the industry's biggest promoters of carcass competitions

Girlie Goody is a legend in the Queensland Beef Industry. The 79 year old has run her 3200 hectare Central Queensland property at Monto, solely, for more than 40 years.

Her father ran cattle at Monto and while she didn't plan following in his footsteps, when he died in her mid-30s, she realized that office work wasn't for her and decided to buy the family farm.

There was just one problem, the bank wouldn't lend her the money. but her brothers, Roy and Tom, were prepared to back her. After just 10 years, Girlie threw a No more mortgage party to celebrate paying out her 30 year loan in full.

Girlie's days revolve around her animals, Joey the quarter horse, chickens, her small herd of goats and her beloved cattle.

Droughts reduced her herd but she still has a mix of 450 British and African breeds. Girlie prefers a mixed herd, partly for its interesting appearance but mostly to track the offspring of various breeds and crosses and to see if it's what abattoirs and carcass judges want.

Girlie learnt horsemanship from her father who was an amateur jockey. He also taught her about cattle.

While his passion was parading them on the hoof in the showring, Girlie prefers on the hooks contests and has been entering and winning competitions for decades.







# Congratulations - Michelle Landry MP Another one of our Amazing Grammar Girls.

Congratulations to Michelle Landry who was re-elected as the representative for the Division of Capricornia in the Federal elections in May 2019.

Michelle Landry was born in Rockhampton, Queensland. She was educated at the Hall State School and was a student at Rockhampton Girls Grammar 1975-1978.

From 1978 to 1985, Michelle worked as a pathology and medical biochemistry laboratory assistant. From 1985 to 2007, she worked at the National Australia Bank. She ran a local bookkeeping business from 1999 to 2009.

Michelle contested the seat of Capricornia for the first time in the 2010 federal election. Her opponent, long-term Labor MP Kirsten Livermore defeated her in a 54-46 two party preferred vote; an 8% swing to the LNP. Following the retirement of Kirsten Livermore in 2013, Michelle won the seat in the 2013 federal election. She was re-elected in both the 2016 and the 2019 federal elections.

In 2018, from February to September, Michelle was Chief Whip in Canberra for the National Party and in August 2018, Michelle became Assistant Minister for Children and Families.

Cert II and Cert III Visual Arts – Jewellery Stream. The TAFE courses introduce many different facets of Jewellery Making and Pat has incorporated these into her work.

She was successful in winning the Student Award for best entry in CQU Creates in 2017 and that piece was bought by CQU for its Art Collection (see photo top right). Except for a few pieces, most of her work has been given to friends.

The gift that gave her most joy was a pendant made as a wedding gift for Genevieve Brazier (Kane) and worn by Genevieve on her wedding day. The shape was cast from a Burdekin plum seed given to Pat by Genevieve's mother, Ngaire.

## Vale - Betty Emslie

Editor's Note: The following vale was written by Betty's cousin, Anne Kricker. Betty was at student at RGGS 1946-1949. She was Dux of the School and the 1949 Helen E Downs Prefect. Betty expressed her love for the School through a very generous bequest as part of her will.

Betty Emslie: Born 7 April 1932, died 15 March 2019, aged 86 years. Much loved daughter of Ettie (Kricker) and Bill ('Tinker') Emslie. From Rockhampton, Betty worked and enjoyed Melbourne life for 60+ years.

Betty's ties to Rockhampton Girls Grammar School were as a former student and enthusiastic supporter, attending Melbourne gatherings of former Grammar School students.

Betty lived in Dibdin St, Wandal although when the family moved there is unknown. A student of Rockhampton Girls Grammar School and most likely at the Central Girls School before that, she passed Junior in 1947 with 6 As and 3 Bs and in November 1949 was 1st in English, French, Latin, Maths A& B and Physics.



Maths and Physics teaching in Rockhampton at that time was only available at the Boys School. A student of the University of Queensland in 1950-1952 and living at Women's College, Betty then moved to Melbourne and joined the Structures Division of the future Defence Science and Technology Organisation - an in-house research and development unit of the Armed Services.

She gained a background in Applied Maths through studies at the University of Melbourne and worked in basic theory of elasticity, initially doing an expanded role in high grade computing for three years.

After developing further experience in Applied Mathematics, spending two years in the Design Department at the Cranfield (UK) College of Aeronautics, Betty devoted herself to aerodynamics in the Aeronautical Research Laboratory in Melbourne in 1953-1994, initially researching flutter calculations for a model aircraft wing and propeller for the design and build of the Nomad aircraft.

It is noteworthy that Betty was the Australian equivalent of the 'computers' at NASA, women who performed mathematical equations and calculations by hand from the mid-1930s into the 1970s, handling data from wind tunnel tests and research divisions. They, and Betty, played an integral role in aeronautical and aerospace research.

Betty loved life, her friends in Melbourne and being outdoors in the Victorian countryside. A naturally cheery and pleasant person, she had a large group of diverse friends in her various pursuits: bushwalking, skiing, the art gallery, opera, reading – a lifelong avid reader - and eating out. Betty was not known for her cooking!

As a St Kilda resident for many decades and earlier on some years in Elsternwick, she rode a Vespa scooter to work at Fisherman's Bend and also down to Avalon during testing of Nomad structures in its early design phases.



Later she moved up to a car! Betty threw herself into retirement, filling every minute with her various activities until poor health caught up with her in the early 2000s, and more substantially in 2014 when she needed accommodation nearby in Emerald Hill, an aged care facility. She was well-liked by all staff there, who looked after her, and all their residents, very well.

Her father Tinker moved from Rockhampton to share her Melbourne apartment on the death of her mother in 1972. He died in 1984.

Her Melbourne friends came to a simple gathering in Melbourne on 20 March 2019 to celebrate her life.

A life well-lived.
